What's Required—Grade By Grade

Welcome to the AoE Blueprint! This academic guide walks you through what your child needs to complete for each grade level while enrolled at AoE, updated for the 2026-27 school year.

NEW THIS YEAR! Learning activities beyond core classes are now required for all AoE students and are now called “AA&E” (which stands for Arts, Athletics, and Enrichment) not “extracurriculars.”

FAQs

Is Health the same as PE?

- No, health is a Core requirement, beginning in first grade and continuing through high school.
- For grades 1–8, health is completed within the core science class, but PE is an AA&E activity.
- For grades 9–12, the first 1.5 credits of graded PE are required. Beyond 1.5 credits students may select additional PE activities as electives.

Are Foreign Language and Personal Finance required in middle school?

- No, these classes become Core requirements in grades 9–12 only.

Are AA&E learning activities required before high school?

- Yes, AoE K4–8 students **must choose at least one and may choose up to three** AA&E activities every semester from the three provided categories.
- Only one activity may be selected from each category.

Are AA&E activities graded?

- K4–8 students receive a pass/fail completion mark for AA&E activities.
- Grades 9–12 students receive a pass/fail completion mark for PE when taken to complete 1.5 credits required for graduation.
- Electives for grades 9–12 students and AA&E activities that are not taken in completion of graduation credit requirements receive a pass/fail completion mark only.

What are the criteria for a pass/fail AA&E activity?

- Pass/fail is based on student participation.
- Students/parents must keep a participation log, noting each session of the activity.
- The log must be signed by the parent or by the activity provider, using the form provided by AoE. *(Form coming soon!)*
- The completed log must be submitted by the end of the semester to AoE via Google Classroom.
- AoE will determine whether the student has passed or failed the activity based on this completed/submitted participation log.

How do I submit my student's AA&E activities and inform AoE about my student's activities for the semester?

- ***Information will be sent in August via email with instructions about submitting information for your students' selected AA&E activities.***

Do we have to commit to AA&E activities for the whole semester?

- Students are encouraged to stick with their chosen activities for the semester.
- If a change is needed due to unusual circumstances, AoE must approve the change. Only one emergency change per semester will be allowed.

Does a “free”/no-charge AA&E activity count for the AoE program requirement?

- Required AA&E activities may be completed without cost. Spending money to meet AA&E program requirements is not an obligation. A free activity (lessons provided by a relative, church recreational league, etc.), approved by AoE, still satisfies AoE AA&E requirements.
- No reimbursement will be issued if there was no charge from the provider for the activity.

How does reimbursement work?

- Reimbursement is paid **up to a maximum of \$1,000 per semester per student**. The total cost for all selected AA&E activities (up to 3) may not exceed \$1000 per student, per semester.
- Reimbursement is paid to parents, not activity providers.
- Two terms are important in the AoE reimbursement context.
 - Invoice: An invoice is a bill from the activity provider, issued before or at the start of the activity, stating the amount owed for the service. An invoice must be submitted to AoE to request reimbursement.
 - Receipt: A receipt is proof from the provider that the invoiced amount has been paid in full, issued after reimbursement is given to parents. A receipt (scan, photo, or digital file) must be submitted to AoE to confirm the entire reimbursement was used to pay the invoice as intended.
 - In short, the invoice says, “This is what is owed,” and the receipt says, “This is what was paid.”
- Reimbursement can be paid in advance of the parent incurring the expense. For advance reimbursement, an invoice from the provider must first be submitted to AoE, showing the amount due for that activity.
- Reimbursement is paid one activity at a time: e.g., if a family has received advance reimbursement for one semester of AA&E activities, no advance reimbursement will be paid for the next semester’s activity for that student until a receipt for full invoice payment has been received by AoE for the *first* semester’s activity.
